Manuscripts should be submitted typed, double-spaced, and with endnotes. The journal only accepts manuscripts via e-mail or CD, in Microsoft WORD or WordPerfect format. A clean paper copy of the manuscript is requested along with the CD. All articles are required to follow the style formats specified in the *Chicago Manual of Style*, 15th edition.

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Front Cover: Headframe of Empire Zinc Company's No. 8 shaft at Hanover, New Mexico, from inside the hoist house. The site produced lead and zinc from the early 1900s. New Jersey Zinc acquired the property in 1927 and erected a flotation mill to replace an electro-magnetic mill built in 1916. Empire Zinc, New Jersey Zinc's subsidiary, sank the shaft to 650 feet. The shaft and mill closed in 1975, and the mill was dismantled. The strike that shut down the mine from October 1950 until January 1952 became the basis for the movie *Salt of the Earth*.

Back Cover: United States Smelting and Refining Company's Bullfrog headframe and crusher at Vanadium, New Mexico. The Bullfrog opened in 1942, ultimately reached 2,100 feet, became the leading producer of lead, zinc, and silver in the state in the 1940s, and closed in 1958. The dumps in the distance belong to the Chino open pit copper mine at Santa Rita. (Editor's photos.)
