The following bibliography contains books, dissertations and theses, articles and chapters of books, and other media—organized within those four categories—that provide new content related to the history of all types of mining in North America (that is, Canada, the United States, and Central America). It does not include book review articles, nor reissued or subsequent editions of material.

Digital capabilities are changing our options for seeing works of interest. Some films and printed works are available for viewing on the internet. We have not included URLs for these, but check the internet for their availability. Moreover, some articles are available only on the internet; for these we have included the URL. In addition, many older books are now being reissued as e-books, and older films are being distributed as DVDs. We did not include them in this compilation since the content is not new. However, if you are interested in an older work, check to see if it is now available as an e-book or DVD (WorldCat.org is a good source for this information).

Conlogue, William. *Undermined in Coal Country: On the Measures in a Working Land*. Baltimore: Johns Hopkins University Press, 2017. [Also an e-book. Explores how two overlapping coal country landscapes—Scranton, Pennsylvania, and Marywood University—have coped with the aftermath of mining.]

Corbeil, Laurent. *The Motions Beneath: Indigenous Migrants on the Urban Frontier of New Spain [1590 to 1630]*. Tucson: University of Arizona Press, 2018. [Also an e-book. New silver mines around San Luis Potosí, Mexico, sparked the need for labor; responding immigrants belonged to ten linguistic groups.]

Crawford, Alan Pell. *How Not to Get Rich: The Financial Misadventures of Mark Twain*. Boston: Houghton Mifflin Harcourt, 2017. [Also an audio CD. Among his many bad investments, Mark Twain planned to strike it rich in soon-to-be failed mines.]

Crouch, Gregory. *The Bonanza King: John Mackay and the Battle over the Greatest Riches in the American West*. New York: Scribner, 2018. [Also an e-book. Explores how Mackay gained a fortune from Nevada's Comstock Lode.]

Crumrin, Timothy R. *Til the Coal Train Hauled It Away: A Memoir of the Rise and Demise of a Small Town*. Bloomington, IN: AuthorHouse, 2017. [West Terre Haute, Indiana, grew due to coal, clay, and gravel mining; when those resources were depleted, a downward spiral began.]

Cities that sprang up to support coal mines and steel mills were often centered on a single employer in a single industry, so often suffered when industry conditions changed.]

Duerden, Timothy J. *Lewis Hine: Photographer and American Progressive*. Jefferson, NC: McFarland, 2018. [His disturbing images of children at work in coal mines and other places triggered the movement to end child labor.]

Echenberg, Myron J. *Humboldt's Mexico: In the Footsteps of the Illustrious German Scientific Traveller*. Montreal: McGill-Queen's University Press, 2017. [Also an e-book. After inspecting New Spain's silver mines in Taxco, Pachuca, and Guanajuato in the early 1800s, Humboldt wrote favorably of their potential, helping to attract British investment, but he also highlighted the deplorable working conditions of the miners and their resulting poor health.]

Marshall, Daniel Patrick. *Claiming the Land: British Columbia and the Making of a New El Dorado*. Vancouver: Ronsdale Press, 2017. [Also an e-book. Set in the 1858 Fraser River gold rush, the book focuses on the conflict between California gold miners and people of the fur trade (both native and Hudson's Bay Company), while the British attempted to retain control in their colony.]

McGirr, Lisa. *The War on Alcohol: Prohibition and the Rise of the American State*. New York: Norton, 2016. [In one section, the author wraps together prohibition, the Ku Klux Klan, evangelicalism, prejudice against Italian immigrants, and the "Herrin Massacre," in which striking Illinois coal miners, strikebreakers, guards, and managers were killed.]

Melillo, Edward Dallam. *Strangers on Familiar Soil: Rediscovering the Chile-California Connection*. New Haven: Yale University Press, 2015. [Among many connections, the author discusses Chilean miners in the California gold rush and the attitude toward Latinos at that time.]

The author's ancestors included the "Seven Iron Men," who pioneered Mesabi Range mining.]
